The Education Committee promotes, designs, supports, and implements educational programs, projects, and services that contribute to the continuing education and training of working archivists, and facilitate the education and training of students who wish to pursue careers in moving image archive management.

Summary:

2020 has been a year of pivoting and change for everyone, the AMIA Education Committee included. Much of the year was spent transitioning and on-boarding new committee leadership and brainstorming how we could bring programming to our members virtually. Two new Student Chapters were started, and a new Student Chapter Discord was created as a way of virtual communication between prospective students, current students, and recent graduates. The Education Committee is also planning numerous virtual events and activities for the 2020 AMIA Conference.

Student Chapter Highlights:

2020 has been a year like no other. The unprecedented challenges of the global pandemic have resulted in the cancellation of in-person lectures and events at many campuses, such as extra-curricular activities and club fairs for new and returning students. However, as more and more events have moved online, the AMIA student chapters have found ways to adapt and create a sense of student community during these socially-distanced times. Many AMIA student members used this time to attend virtual seminars available through AMIA on-demand. In addition, a number of AMIA student chapter members were inducted into the very first cohort of the AMIA Diversity and Inclusion Fellowship!

Prior to the shutdown, members of the student chapter at Ryerson were able to present their research of CFMDC materials at the 2019 AMIA conference in Baltimore. They also took a trip to Ottawa for a private tour of the audio-visual vaults at Libraries and Archives Canada! The University of Toronto chapter also participated in off-sites tours, with a behind-the-scenes glimpse of independent video art distributor Vtape and the CBC Archives. The University of Toronto chapter raised funding to organise a virtual training session on the recording and preservation of oral histories. Both Toronto chapters have had successful outreach initiatives to incoming students, with record numbers of first year members.

The UCLA chapter had a busy year with tours, networking events and archival screenings in the James Bridges Theatre. Prints for screenings came on loan from the UCLA Film & Television Archive and USC Hugh Hefner Archive. Many members also garnered exceptional internship opportunities to build skills and implement class learning into hands-on, practical workflows.

The Chapter at Rochester were similarly keen to reach new students. They hosted a meet and greet in a local venue to introduce students to both AMIA and the city. The chapter also hosted Home Movie Day Rochester in 2019, where guests were able to directly interact with film inspectors and attend a brief presentation on the history of small gauge film.

The NYU Student Chapter hosted a successful Home Movie Day at the Long Island City Community Library, in collaboration with the Queen's Public Library and XFR collective. One of their student members produced video documentation of the event, which was then uploaded to the Internet Archive for public access via https://archive.org/details/homemovieday2019. They also organised a number of site visits, social activities and workshops for student members.

In Amsterdam, the Internal Documentary Festival Amsterdam (IDFA) 2019 led to a collaboration between AMIA UvA, IDFA and VoxPop. The partners organized an afternoon with three separate talks and interviews with European filmmakers and archivists. The chapter also organised a screening at the Eye Filmmuseum, with different formats such DCP, 16mm and 35mm. At the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic, the students contributed to a self-archiving project regarding student life: <u>https://covid19communities.humanities.uva.nl/</u>

All of the student chapters are looking forward to finding new ways to connect online this year, from social media and online games, to training webinars and virtual conference attendance. There is the potential for greater collaboration between chapters who would otherwise be geographically removed. We have also welcomed two new student chapters for the 2020-2021 academic year, based in Paris and Alabama. Despite the difficulties of adapting to remote instruction, the student chapters are determined to continue learning and connecting with audio-visual professionals and archivists across the globe.
